Learning robotics and coding in the Library

The Yankalilla Library has six robots and Android tablets for robotics and coding (programming) workshops. The tennis ball-sized robots, called Sphero bots, are designed to teach coding and robotics to children and teens from beginners to more advanced. Sphero bots can be controlled like a remotecontrolled car, by driving them in real time, or they can be pre-programmed in several programming languages, enabling them to grow with the children's coding abilities. Most of our coding of Sphero Bots is done using code blocks, which is nearly identical to coding with MIT-Scratch, which is frequently taught in schools.

In workshops held every Thursday afternoon, we have been driving the

Sphero Bots over and under bridges and through mazes, played bowling, tag and chasing games, and have done a more involved navigational challenge- programming our Spheros to land on Mars (a printout of Mars at least). You have to watch where you step with six Spheros rolling around the room!

The emphasis in the workshops is fun, exploration, and creativity with games, challenges, and free play at the end of sessions.

Sphero robotics and coding workshops are being held weekly on Thursdays between 3:30-4:30pm, while in the January School Holidays there will be three 90-minute workshops (beginner, intermediate and advanced/12+).

Legislated By-Laws Review 2023

- By-Law 3: Roads;
- By-Law 4: Movable Signs; and
- By-Law 6: Foreshore

Detailed concept plans have been developed for the 862m section between Haycock Point and the Carrickalinga Creek estuary (Stage 2), completing the path for the length of Gold Coast Drive. To help us make informed decisions, it is important to understand what the community likes about the concept plans, and where there might be concerns or challenges.

Capital Projects Update





Normanville SLSC

We are pleased to provide an update on Council's capital projects. We encourage the community to visit our website for a detailed breakdown of the total budget of project expenditure for each project. All information is current as of the time of publishing.

Normanville SLSC & Café/Kiosk

The Normanville SLSC & Cafe/ Kiosk project is progressing well and the team has made significant strides in recent weeks. The project remains on track in line with its original timeframe which has been an outstanding and commendable effort from all involved in the project.

We are excited to share the following recent highlights:

Second Fix Services - The installation of second fix services is progressing smoothly, showcasing meticulous attention to detail which we (and our community) expect whilst ensuring the functionality and aesthetic aspects align with our project goals.

Interior Painting – Painters are actively engaged in painting the interiors, transforming the spaces into vibrant and cohesive environments. This phase is crucial in bringing the envisioned design to life and creating a welcoming atmosphere.

External Painting - The external painting is nearing completion, marking a major milestone in the project timeline. This stage has been transformational and it not only enhances the overall aesthetics but also contributes to the durability and

protection of the structure against external elements.

Foreshore

Joinery and Kitchen Installation -The joinery work is in full swing, showcasing the craftsmanship and precision required for a seamless integration of custom elements. Simultaneously, the kitchen installation is underway, ensuring a functional and aesthetically pleasing culinary space.

Floor Finishes - Progress has been made on the floor finishes, adding the final touch to the interior spaces. Each step in this process is carefully executed to meet the project's high standards of quality and design.

Glass Installation - A significant development has included the arrival and installation of glass components. The stair balustrading is now in place, providing both safety and an elegant design element. Additionally, balcony glass installation has been completed, enhancing the overall visual appeal of the exterior.

The CEO and Director provided early access to the building site for Aqua Blue (Firkin Burger) to commence fit out of the Café and Kiosk. This agreement was outlined in a waiver document prepared by Wallmans Lawyers to the benefit of Council and to protect the Council from any liability or loss. This 'agreement to lease' document protects Council's interests). Early access to commence fit-out is in the best interest of all parties.

Normanville SLSC & Cafe/ Kiosk Tenancy Leases

At its 1 August 2023 Special Meeting, Council resolved to enter into formal leasing arrangements with two proposed tenants of the key spaces within the new Normanville SLSC & Cafe/ Kiosk building:

- a. The Normanville Surf Life Saving Club INC. on non-commercial terms; and
- b. Kenton Day (Firkin Burger PTY LTD) on commercial terms.

Further details on the Council resolutions can be found on Council's website within the 1 August Special Council Meeting minutes.

Public Consultation on the leases, a requirement of Section 202(2) of the Local Government Act 1999 and Councils Public Consultation Policy, commenced on Thursday 24 August and concluded on Thursday 14 September 2023. A further report to Council which references the outcomes of the Public Consultation is included in the 21 November 2023 Council Agenda.

Formal negotiations on the draft leases have now taken place with the Director Assets and Environment and CEO along with Wallmans Lawyers meeting with each of the tenants and their legal representatives on multiple occasions.

The Council's starting position on a number of key elements, terms or clauses was outlined in the resolutions from 1 August and then further discussed and refined through two Elected Member Information & Briefing Sessions.

BIG4 Normanville Jetty Holiday Park & Future Management Model Options

Following a presentation to Elected Members in August 2023 which was held in confidence due to commercially sensitive information being discussed, Council's primary focus has been on a more detailed exploration into two potential management models for the park.

After a comprehensive assessment of the two models under final consideration and careful review of independent analyses conducted by Norman Waterhouse Lawyers in 2022, Innoviv Park Solutions in 2023, and BDO in 2023, Council's Audit & Risk Committee have considered the matter and recommends that the Council take steps to commence the process of pursuing a Management License as the preferred option for overseeing the management of the BIG4 Normanville Jetty Holiday Park.

Normanville Foreshore

Neo Infrastructure have completed the Normanville foreshore hardscape works in early November including stormwater drainage, concrete plaza and retaining wall extensions. These works are starting to give a 'finished product' feel to the whole upgraded Foreshore.

A practical completion and defect inspection was undertaken early November with minor items identified for remediation, Neo Infrastructure will be addressing these items throughout November. The project remains under a defect liability period until November 2024 with responsibility under the contract for the contractor to complete any work to rectify defects during this time.

As all hardscape works are now completed, Council's Parks and Gardens staff are undertaking the soft landscaping component of works including landscaping of the new garden beds and laying of new turf in front of the SLSC & Café/Kiosk, Council's Parks and Gardens

staff will also take the opportunity to undertake maintenance on the landscaped areas from Stage 1 prior to the summer period.

Site fencing is to be removed to coincide with the completion of the SLSC & Café/ Kiosk build, allowing access for the community to the new plaza area.

The asphalt reseals and final line marking of the Foreshore carpark has now been completed. Wheel stops are to be installed for all car parks fronting footpath areas within the foreshore.

Yankalilla Cultural Centre and Library

As reported in previous months, practical completion for the construction of the new library building was issued prior to its official opening, with a defect inspection undertaken at this time. A number of defects have been resolved however a number remain outstanding and are being worked through in line with the dispute resolution clauses of the contract.

Further discussion and mediation is ongoing between the Builder, Superintendent and Council, working towards resolving all matters outstanding under the contract.

Notwithstanding the above, the project remains under a defect liability period until January 2024 with responsibility under the contract for the Builder to complete any outstanding works and to rectify defects during this time, including any additional defects identified.

In accordance with the AS4000 contract, if defect rectification is not completed the Council may have the rectification carried out by others. The cost thereby incurred shall be certified by the Superintendent as moneys due, and payable to the Council.

Council holds a bank guarantee as financial security, to be released once all contract matters are resolved and the contract reaches final completion.

Exercising your Dog in a Public Place on our Beaches and Reserves

Dog owners are responsible for their pet's behaviour in the community. Legislation states that dogs must be on a leash not exceeding 2 meters in public areas, unless specified otherwise by Council controls. .

Council's controls aim to strike a balance that caters to the diverse needs of our beach and reserve visitors. We designate specific areas where families can unwind and play without disturbances from dogs,

while also allocating areas where dog owners can freely exercise their pets off-leash.

For an optimal experience in our reserves and on our beaches, it's crucial to familiarise vourself with the controls applicable to the area you're exploring. Keep in mind that our controls may vary based on the time of year and the time of day.

As our beaches and reserves are busier during the warmer months, changes to when and where your dog can be on-and-off-lease come into effect from December to February and on the Easter Long weekend. These on-leash controls are implemented between 10am to 6pm on most our beaches unless they within an area that requires your dog to be on-leash at all times. (i.e 200m either side of the Normanville Jetty and 100m either side of the Carrickalinga toilet block).

When exercising your dog in a designated "off leash" area, it is a requirement that your dog is under effective control. It is also important to remember that not all dogs like to be approached by other dogs and quite often these dogs may remain on a lead while passing through an off-leash area, we ask that you be mindful of other dogs and their owners to avoid any unpleasant experiences.

Effective control means that your dog is trained and will always return to you when called, is never out of your sight and will not demonstrate hostility to people or other animals.

We encourage you to visit Council's website - Exercising Dogs on District Beaches and Reserves . https://www. yankalilla.sa.gov.au/services/animalsand-pests/dogsonbeaches to find essential information on when and where you dog can be exercised onand-off leash.

We strongly advocate for responsible dog ownership throughout our District, and we kindly request that current registration discs be visibly worn by dogs to facilitate identification. Additionally, we emphasise the prompt and proper disposal of dog faeces to maintain a clean and pleasant environment for all to enjoy.

Fridge and Freezer Food Safety: A Guide to Preventing Food Poisoning

Recent research indicates that many Australians are unaware that cold food should be stored at or below 5°C. Proper storage at these temperatures significantly reduces the risk of food poisoning. Storing perishable foods in the fridge or freezer is essential to prevent food poisoning, slow down spoilage, and maintain food quality. Maintaining a temperature of 5°C or colder inhibits the growth of bacteria responsible for food poisoning and spoilage. However, it's crucial to note that refrigerated food has a limited shelf life, and some bacteria, like Listeria, can still grow.

Get a Fridge Thermometer

To ensure your fridge is at the correct temperature, invest in a thermometer and place it inside. Fridge temperatures can vary, with the door and top shelf often being warmer. Adjust the fridge settings if the thermometer indicates a temperature higher than five degrees, aiming for the main compartment to hover around 4 to 5°C. For freezers, the standard operating temperature is -18°C or below, ensuring food is frozen solid. Some models allow temperature adjustments, but others are designed

to operate at -18°C. Regularly defrost your freezer to prevent ice buildup.

What Foods to Store in the Fridge

All perishable and cooked foods should be stored in the fridge to prevent bacterial growth and reduce spoilage. Pay attention to storage instructions on packaged foods, especially those requiring refrigeration. When the fridge is full, prioritise items that need refrigeration and consider temporarily removing non-perishable items like drinks, pickles, and jams. Adequate air circulation between items in the fridge is crucial to maintaining a consistent temperature.

Where to Store Food in the Fridge

When storing food in the fridge, place ready-to-eat food above raw items to prevent cross-contamination. Store raw meats, seafood, and poultry on the coldest shelf, typically the bottom one, ensuring liquids don't drip onto other foods. Separate raw and cooked foods, covering ready-to-eat items to reduce the risk of cross-contamination.

Freeze and Defrost Food Safely

Freezing and defrosting food requires careful attention. Freeze food in

smaller quantities to expedite the process and minimise bacterial growth. When freezing newly purchased items, use freezer bags to maintain quality and prevent crosscontamination. Label and date items to track storage times. Thaw frozen food thoroughly, especially poultry and meat joints, before cooking. Follow package instructions for thawing and cooking, as some items can be cooked without thawing.

The storage life of frozen food depends on temperature. While safety-wise, frozen items like vegetables and meat can be stored for years, there will be a decline in nutrient value and quality over time. Chest freezers operating at -18°C can extend storage times to three months or more, depending on the fat content. Refer to your freezer's guidelines for recommended storage times.

Practicing proper fridge and freezer food safety is crucial for preventing food poisoning and maintaining food quality. By following these guidelines, you can ensure that your stored food remains safe and retains its nutritional value.

Bushfire Preparedness

Protecting the Community and Property

As residents of the stunning District Council of Yankalilla we are blessed with natural beauty and a close-knit community. However, our region is not immune to the challenges posed by Australia's climate, especially during El Nino years. These periods of abnormal ocean warming can heighten the risk of bushfires in our area, making it crucial for us to be prepared, vigilant, and informed. In this article, we'll discuss what an El Nino year means for us, how to prepare our properties for bushfires, and where to find critical information for bushfire survival planning.

Understanding El Nino:

El Nino, a climatic phenomenon characterised by elevated temperatures in the Pacific Ocean, can lead to warmer and drier conditions. This translates into an increased bushfire risk for our region. It's vital to be aware of the potential impacts:

- Drought Conditions: El Nino often results in reduced rainfall and dry spells, creating conditions ripe for bushfires.
- 2. **Elevated Temperatures:** Hotter temperatures can exacerbate fire dangers, making it essential to stay cool and hydrated during heatwayes.

Bushfire Preparation for Your Property:

- Clear Vegetation: Trim overhanging branches and remove dry vegetation near your home. Creating a firebreak can slow the advance of a bushfire.
- 2. **Gutter Maintenance:** Keep gutters clear of leaves and debris. This helps prevent ember attacks on your roof.
- Water Supply: Ensure you have a reliable water source and firefighting equipment, such as hoses and pumps, readily available.
- 4. **Emergency Kits:** Prepare emergency kits with essential supplies, including water, nonperishable food, first-aid items, and important documents.

Creating Your Bushfire Survival Plan: Developing a comprehensive bushfire survival plan is paramount. Consider these steps:

- 1. Family Meeting: Discuss and agree on your bushfire survival plan with your family or household members. Everyone should understand their roles and responsibilities.
- **2. Alert Systems:** Familiarise yourself with emergency alert systems like the South Australian Alert SA app and emergency broadcasts.
- **3. Evacuation Routes:** Identify multiple evacuation routes from your area. Roads may become congested during a bushfire.
- **4. Meeting Points:** Establish meeting points outside your home and in your community where family members can reunite if separated.

We encourage all residence to educate themselves by visiting the CFS Bushfire Survival Plan webpage.

In the event of a fast-approaching bushfire and if evacuating is no longer an option, District Council of Yankalilla offers designated Bushfire Safer Places and Last Resort Refuges.

Creating Your Bushfire Survival Bushfire Safe Place A bushfire safe place is a place of relative safety. It may be used as a first resort for people who have planned to leave high risk location early on a bad fire day.

1. Normanville – This area is recognised as a safe area within the Council area.

Last Resort Refuge: Using a Bushfire Last Resort Refuge is a last-resort option if your plan fails, and you can't reach a Bushfire Safer Place. These refuges are typically open fields and ovals marked with a sign. However, they lack facilities and aren't suitable for pets of livestock.

Keep in mind that these refuges may not offer much protection or safety during an extreme fire situation. They can be uncomfortable and still pose a risk, but they're better than being stranded on the road or on foot.
