Welcome to the first edition of In The Loop for 2024. A new year brings an opportunity to reflect on our past achievements and look ahead to the opportunities and challenges that lie ahead.

Over the last few years, our district has seen the successful completion of several significant projects. Outcomes such as the Normanville Foreshore redevelopment (including the Holiday Park and the Surf Lifesaving Club with Café/ Kiosk), the Yankalilla Library expansion, upgrades to Forktree Road and new facilities at Ingalalla Falls, have given us all something to be proud of and the enjoy as a community. While these projects required substantial investment, much of the funding came from external sources, making them incredibly valuable opportunities for our district.

The strategic and opportune investments made in these projects however require us now to make some adjustments to our financial strategy. With approximately \$5 million of accumulated carry-forward projects from previous budget years and borrowing reaching its inevitable limit, we are now making adjustments to planned outcomes across the

remainder of the financial year. Making fiscally prudent decisions in the here and now ensures the community can benefit from the investment in new infrastructure in an ongoing sense. A key change that we have made is the necessary and conscious choice to pause new projects for the next five months allowing us to focus on highly visible and highly valuable services to our community. The switch away from projects to operational services ensures we operate within our means and create a long-term sustainable future.

Looking ahead, our priority will be to propose a 2024-25 Annual Business Plan and Budget that does not require additional borrowing. This means ensuring that income covers all expenditures and allocating resources to pay down existing loans responsibly. While some projects that were originally in the 2023-24 budget will need to be deferred until the 2024-25 budget, we remain committed to continuing to deliver the essential services that our community expects.

In this month's Capital Projects Update, we provide more details to flesh out my statements above with further details on the achievements of the past seven months whilst outlining the strategic decisions regarding project deferrals. Despite the need to adjust our course, we're proud of the progress we've made in enhancing our community's infrastructure and amenities. We recognise the importance of engaging with you, our community members as we chart our course for the next 4-5 years. On that note, there will be considerable discussion around this updated approach during the update of Our DCY: Vision 2030 project and through the development of our next Annual Business Plan & Budget. We look forward to having discussions with you on the development of these plans.

As we navigate these challenges and opportunities together, we remain committed to transparency, accountability and responsiveness in our decision-making processes. Your input and participation are invaluable as we strive to prioritise projects and initiatives that reflect your priorities and aspirations.

Citizen of the Year Award -Jon Jaensch

Jon Jaensch embodies a lifetime of extraordinary service and selflessness in the Yankalilla community. A resident since 1974, Jon's journey began as a dedicated school teacher in the local district, setting the stage for a remarkable legacy of community engagement.

In 1976, Jon joined the local volunteer ambulance team, starting with St Johns and later transitioning to the SA Ambulance Service. Across 47 years, he has held various pivotal roles, including serving as the Yankalilla team leader from 2007 to 2022 and acting as a Zone representative since 2009. His commitment goes beyond the call of duty, extending to training and assessing students and ensuring a legacy of skilled emergency responders in the community.

Jon's impact is felt deeply within the Yankalilla Lutheran Church, where he has been an Elder for 48 years. His roles as a lay reader, worship leader and provider of free firewood for those in need showcase his diverse contributions to the spiritual and material well-being of his community.

Not confined to his local church, Jon is a key figure in the Yankalilla Inter Church Council Committee, uniting five local Christian denominations. Through his efforts in collecting bottles and cans, Jon has been instrumental in funding vital community services, including community transport cars, a food pantry, and events like community Christmas carols and the 'Escape the Vape' forum with the Yankalilla Area School.

Jon's influence extends to the broader community through his role in providing free education with CPR 30 sessions, empowering community members to respond effectively in emergencies. Despite receiving numerous accolades, such as the Distinguished Service Award in April 2023, Jon remains a humble figure, consistently working to recruit and train new ambulance volunteers.

The 2024 Citizen of the Year Award is a well-deserved recognition of Jon Jaensch's profound impact on Yankalilla. His unwavering dedication to community service, spanning nearly

five decades, is a testament to his commitment to creating a better and safer environment for all.

The event successfully attracted visitors from both within and outside the region, bringing together developers, producers, sellers and users of agricultural technology. This collaborative platform created opportunities for knowledge exchange, idea sharing and crucially, the strengthening of community bonds.

With a primary objective of engaging students in various agricultural career pathways, Fleurieu AG FEST hosted over 250 secondary students from schools across the Fleurieu region. These students had the unique opportunity to interact directly with professionals in the agricultural sector, gaining insights into potential career paths and opportunities.

The event went beyond its educational focus, providing a platform for local businesses to showcase and promote their products and services. AG FEST significantly contributed to the exposure and expansion of local businesses, fostering economic growth within the community.

The overwhelmingly positive response to AG FEST, with consistent calls for the event to be held annually, underscores its success in bridging the gap between farming and town populations. The event not only provided a shared understanding of the challenges and opportunities within the agricultural industry but also raised awareness about food production, environmental sustainability and the importance of supporting local agriculture.

The Myponga Reservoir parkrun Volunteers embody the spirit of active citizenship through their positive impact on health, community and inclusivity.

Myponga Reservoir parkrun, launched on April 9th, 2022, has become a cornerstone for health and well-being in our local region. These free, weekly community events take place every Saturday morning at 8 am, offering a welcoming and inclusive environment for individuals to walk or run a timed five kilometre course.

The parkrun experience transcends the traditional notion of running,

embracing participants regardless of whether they walk, jog, run, volunteer or spectate. In the heart of the Myponga Reservoir Reserve, this parkrun has not only promoted physical fitness but has also showcased our region and fostered a sense of community among diverse individuals who may not ordinarily come together.

What sets Myponga Reservoir parkrun apart is its commitment to inclusivity. Notable examples include Rolf Schmidt, a blind runner, and his guide, Craig White, who took part in Event #16 on Saturday, July 23rd, 2022, finding the hilly course challenging yet immensely enjoyable. Additionally, the parkrun has accommodated wheelchair users, with individuals taking advantage of the electricassisted all-terrain wheelchair provided by the District Council of Yankalilla.

The Myponga Reservoir parkrun has not only enabled people to improve their fitness but has also served as a platform for individuals to connect with others, whether as runners, walkers, or volunteers. The event's success is a testament to the 134 different volunteers who dedicate their time, taking it in turns to be one of the six volunteers required each week to make the parkrun possible.

Myponga Reservoir parkrun has become a community hub, attracting not only locals but also tourist parkrunners from near and far, including interstate and sometimes even overseas events.

The Carrickalinga to Normanville Path is a project, staged over time, to create approximately 6 km of shared-use path between North Bay Carrickalinga and the Normanville Foreshore.

Detailed concept plans have been developed for the 862m section between Haycock Point and the Carrickalinga Creek estuary (Stage 2), completing the path for the length of Gold Coast Drive. To help us make informed decisions, it is important to understand what the community likes about the concept plans, and where there might be concerns or challenges.

Community Grants Awarded

As part of our Australia Day Celebrations, certificates were presented to the representatives of the various community groups that were successful in receiving Community Grant Funding from Council for 2023/24 Financial Year.

Successful applicants have shared in \$16,830 in community funding this financial year. In addition to this funding, the Myponga Memorial Community Centre was granted \$25,000, the Yankalilla Memorial Park was also granted \$25,000 and \$15,000 was granted to the Arts and Creativity Grants Program.

This Annual Program provides incredible value across the community and the next round of Community Grant Applications will open again later in the year for the 2025/26 Financial Year. 

Fleurieu Advance Care Directive Program in Yankalilla



The Fleurieu Advance Care Directive Program is a free volunteer service that provides general information to assist you in understanding the Advance Care Directive form.

What is an Advance Care Directive?

It is a legal document for anyone over the age of 18 and makes it

easy for others to know what your health wishes are if you are unable to communicate these decisions yourself.

Eating Outdoors

Eating outdoors is a great way to make the best of Australia's great climate. However, eating outdoors increases the risk of food poisoning for a number of reasons.

For example, your food will be stored in a cooler such as an esky. This makes it much more difficult to maintain a safe food storage temperature of 5°C or below than a fridge at home.

Follow these tips to make sure your fun day out doesn't turn into a nightmare:

Chill

- Remember the simple rule for food safety; keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Put all perishable foods in a cooler when travelling.
- Don't pack food for a picnic if it has just been cooked and is still warm, coolers cannot cool food enough to prevent bacteria growing.
- Always cover pre-prepared foods securely and keep in the refrigerator overnight. Other perishable foods and drinks, such as deli products, cooked chicken and dairy products must also be cold when put in the cooler.
- Always pack plenty of frozen bricks or gel packs around the food. Frozen drinks thaw quickly in warm weather and serve as extra cool bricks. Wicker baskets, unless they are insulated, are best used for non-perishables and your other picnic needs.
- Avoid keeping perishables such as salads, quiches and cold meats out of the fridge for longer than 4 hours before eating. If you expect to return leftovers to the fridge, they should be left out for no more than 2 hours.

Separate

 Meat juices can easily leak onto pre-prepared foods, so pack with this in mind and put the meat in leak proof containers on the bottom of the cooler away from ready-to-eat food.





- Cut meat into serving-size
 pieces before leaving home and
 have all salads ready to eat. This
 reduces the need to handle foods,
 particularly when there are no
 hand-washing facilities.
- Use a clean plate and clean utensils for cooked meat. Never re-use the same ones you used for the raw meat without washing them.

Clean

- Carry disposable wipes or alcoholbased hand gel in case there is no water for hand washing.
- Don't put food directly on picnic tables as they are not always clean so use clean plates or trays.

Cook

- Remember sausages, hamburgers and poultry need to be cooked all the way through – use a meat thermometer to check they have reached 75°C in the centre. Intact steaks and whole pieces of red meat can be cooked to taste.
- It's all right to leave cooked meat to remain warm on a corner of the BBQ or covered on a plate for late arrivals. Just ensure it is protected from flies and, as with cold perishables, avoid leaving it around for more than four hours, (or two hours if there are leftovers to be put into the fridge).

Additional tips for BBQs at home

- Keep your meat in the fridge until you are ready to put it on the BBQ and keep all ready-to-eat food covered until you are ready to eat it. This will protect it from contamination by flies.
- dips and other perishable products in the fridge until needed. It may seem like a great idea to leave food out so that guests can nibble throughout the whole day, but unfortunately, bacteria will also have a feast. It's better to divide these higherrisk perishable foods into small amounts and replenish them with fresh portions as required.
- It is even more important than indoor events that you don't mix fresh top-ups with ones that have been outside for some time where they may also have been enjoyed by flies. Low-risk foods, such as nuts, crisps, and crackers can be topped up.

Capital Projects Update

In this edition of In The Loop, we provide an overview of the Council's Capital Projects, highlighting achievements over the past seven months and outlining strategic decisions regarding project deferrals. Additionally, we address community concerns relating to Council's commitment to financial sustainability as we start to develop the strategic plan for the next 4-5 years.

Project Achievements Over the Past Seven Months

The past seven months have been a whirlwind of activity as we've been busy working on delivering numerous projects to enhance our community. We have made significant progress across many of the projects that were allocated funding in the 2023-24 budget. Here's a quick rundown of what we've been up to:

- Approximately \$200K has been spent delivering stage 2 of the Community Garden, the CHSP on demand service, tree trimming, hosting and sponsoring major events such as the Festival of Nature and Australia Day Citizen of the Year celebrations, implementing the Economic Development Strategy, conserving our coastlines with the Coastal Conservation team and Fleurieu Coast Community Nursery and Community Revegetation Program, and supporting our community through the delivery of grants.
- \$4.1 million has been utilised for new construction and improvements (capital works) and we have seen some remarkable achievements, such as the completion of the Surf Life Saving Club and Café/Kiosk and enhancing the Normanville Foreshore. The funds have also enabled the finalisation of the Yankalilla Library car park, the purchase of new plant equipment

- to enable safe and efficient township maintenance and upkeep and work on sealing Scenic Way.
- About \$1.6 million has been invested in replacement and renewal work on our sealed and unsealed road network, recreational spaces, the Blacker Road Bridge replacement and replacement of large plant and equipment that has reached the end of its useful life.

In the first seven months of the year, we've achieved close to \$6 million worth of planned work, already surpassing what Council would have ordinarily achieved over a full 12-month period prior to the COVID stimulus funds and resulting major capital project delivery.

Strategic Decision for Deferral:

Despite these achievements, it's always important to recognise the evolving financial landscape and adjust our course accordingly if necessary. Following a thorough evaluation, we've made the decision to defer some projects initially planned for this year to the next financial year. This decision wasn't made lightly, but it's crucial for maintaining our commitment to financial sustainability.

We've observed a trend of carrying forward approximately \$5 million from past budgets without sufficient income to cover them. In the past, Council has been able to borrow funds from the Local Government Financing Authority. This has allowed Council to pay for the projects now and spread the repayment of these loans across the generations who will benefit from the investment. Council has now reached the end of its large borrowing peak, and in order to balance things out, we're postponing certain projects until we have adequate funds to complete

them without borrowing. We need to ensure that we are not carrying forward obligations without the income to pay for them.

These projects include cemetery works, new plant purchases (such as dedicated Roadside Vegetation Management units), flooring upgrades in pet-friendly budget rooms at the BIG4 Normanville Jetty Holiday Park, the Range Road Renewal project and the Tjilbruke marker site project. A full list of the deferred projects can be found in the February Capital Projects Update Report to Council. By delaying these projects, we can concentrate on taking care of what we already have with some much-needed maintenance activities.

Community Engagement and Future Direction:

As we make these strategic adjustments, we're seeking your thoughts on what Council should prioritise in the next 4-5 years. This aligns with our ongoing community engagement efforts outlined in our 'Our DCY: Vision 2030' project.

We want to understand your priorities, challenges and aspirations. Whether you choose to share your thoughts online or attend our engagement events, your participation is crucial in shaping the future of our community.

Ensuring our financial sustainability is paramount. With access to loans reaching its peak, we must spend funds in the year they're received and balance our resource needs with our capabilities.

Despite deferring some projects, we're proud of the significant achievements we've made through leveraging grants and borrowing. These efforts have delivered transformative investments benefiting our community and visitors.


